Some "Old Fashion mid-summer Bible Teaching" The Reverend Heinz D. Raidel

Luther wrote that the purpose of the Gospel and the message of Jesus was summed up as "comforting the afflicted and afflicting the comforted." Luther meant that while we're comforted with Jesus' words and promises and actions; at the same time we're being informed that we're so "messed up" that the only way for us to ever be right is through what Jesus does for us.

One of my favorite TV series was "Justified". The lead character (Raylon Givens) was a seriously flawed but well intentioned Deputy US Marshal who had been reassigned from sunny Florida, to where he grew up in the Eastern District of Kentucky. His Appalachian background both helped and hindered him there, at times. (I liked that about him for some reason.) One of Raylon's memorable quotes (and yes, I cleaned it up a little) was something to the effect of "If you wake up in the morning and meet one problem person, that person is a problem. If you meet problem persons all day long, then you are the problem." Perhaps unintentionally, Raylon had almost paraphrased Luther, in that he both comforted and afflicted the listener in a more contemporary way.

Here's the Old Fashion Biblical Part: My favorite Old Testament writer/prophet, was similar to both Luther and Raylon, in that he brought both the comfort and the affliction of God's words to the people (and to a King). I am referring to Amos, who was on the scene around 750 BC. Amos (I know, what a name) brought the word of God primarily to King Jeroboam II, but Amos's words from God were not limited to just the King. Amos repeated God's words and reminders to the people of Israel as well. And, we could say that Amos did not mince words.

Back story: Centuries before Amos, God established a relationship with the Hebrews. The relationship was covenantal, an agreement that God proclaimed the Hebrews as his people, and it stipulated behavior on the part of the Hebrews, that would reflect on God's proclamation.


Except... by the time Amos came along, the Hebrews had been practicing some serious selective memory, in that they were following the Covenant when it benefited them and not so much when it did not. So God called Amos to go from Judah to Israel and bring God's words to the Hebrews. Amos told (or reminded) them, (again, in rather harsh words) that they were to take care of the poor, take care of the widows, tend to the sick, and they were to return their attention to living faithfully according to the covenant.

To be precise, Amos was the first of the prophets to use the term "Day of the Lord," a term which the Hebrews

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interpreted as the day God would destroy God's enemies.

However, Amos included Israel as one of God's enemies, in that Israel was guilty of injustice towards the poor, the sick, the elderly, immigrants, and young women. So for folks hearing and reading Amos, "The Day of the Lord" is a day of doom.

This sure is cheerful summertime stuff isn't it?

So let's toss this in the lesson before we go on. Maybe most importantly, Amos also told them that while God intended to lay Israel low, God would indeed rebuild Israel in righteousness. That's a complicated way of saying God was going to clean house and then make things right.

So, obviously, the cleaning house part was rather pointedly "afflicting" and the restoration part was quite "comforting".

Now, back to 2019. I am pretty sure we can learn a thing or two from Amos. (As John Prine once said "Any similarities to the current situation are intentional.") It is pretty obvious that God is still speaking to us through the words of Amos. We're still called to take care of the poor, the sick, and the elderly. Jesus' words echo what God said through Amos, in that whatever we do for the least among us, we do for Jesus.

But maybe most importantly for our faith lives, the words of Amos are still telling us that while we fall short of God's expectations, we live in the comfort from the promise of God, that through his son Jesus Christ, we can be renewed, and we will be restored.

And I think that is worth repeating. The promise of God, from the first of the minor prophets Amos, to the son of God, Jesus Christ, is that through God's love and grace we can always be renewed, and we will be restored.

Amen!

- 5 unsharpened #2 pencils bound together with a rubber band
- 5 blue or black ball point pens bound together with a rubber band
- 1 box– 16 or 24 count crayons
- 1-2.5 inch eraser


If you have not yet linked your Rewards card to Grace, please do so ASAP, our account number is QS108. Let's see how much we can earn in the next three months.
