FROM THE PASTOR- The Power Of The Word.

When I was in grade school my dad would take my brother and I with him to a wild game supper he and his buddies would put on around Christmas. One of his buddies was the former police chief of Obetz who did car repair on the side. They would move cars and machinery out of the way and set up tables. Then everyone would bring and label their contributions. These old school sportsmen would bring their prizes: Bear from Canada, elk from out west, waterfowl of many descriptions, and deer from everywhere. To be quite frank, my dad was a prankster. I was young, but I saw what he did. Which was...

He had dug the remnants of an old billy goat out of the freezer, cooked it, brought it to the wild game supper, and intentionally mislabeled it as wild sheep. (One year he brought horse meat and mislabeled it as moose, but that's another story.) Anyhow, after the prayers were said and the dinner began, food was served buffet style. I went by the "wild sheep" without putting any on my plate. One of my dad's buddies asked why, and I said "No thank you, I have already eaten goat meat." He replied "You mean sheep, right, you know there is a difference?"

As I was taught to not question adults... I just let him go on. Then I watched him eat the goat meat, which was horrible. Horrible. Disgustingly horrible. Never assume you know more than a kid whose dad brought the wild sheep buddy is what I was thinking... Later I learned my dad's buddies were always pranking each other, and this was my dad's way of "getting back."


Now, "getting back" is the exact opposite of a thing called "atonement and forgiveness." I was reading Leviticus 4:27-31 a few days ago and it outlined a way for the Hebrews under the covenant to make atonement and receive forgiveness for their sins. The process involved bringing a young female goat and having the priest sacrifice it at the altar. Having done that, the person was forgiven as the priest and the goat "atoned" for the sin of the person, and God forgave them.

I am not sure we realize how much that sacrifice would cost the early Hebrew. The goat they would have burned was costly in terms of feed. It would have been costly in that they could have fed a large family with that goat for some time. And it being a female goat, it would have meant a lost possibility of two baby goats the next spring. All this I am sure reminded the Hebrews of the seriousness of sin.

formed in the blood of Jesus Christ, gives us a slightly different outlook on sin and atonement. It's a story that can't be told enough. Our Creator God allowed his son to become human, and indeed sacrificed for all of humanity. As the priest and the goat atoned for the Hebrew's sins, so Jesus's sacrifice atones for our sins. We're forgiven through Jesus' sacrifice.

And, here is the good news, the promise, and the hope from Jesus' sacrifice: it did not end with the sacrifice. God resurrected Jesus from his death to show that with atonement and forgiveness comes new and eternal life! (It was also to show that God's idea of life is stronger than death, but that too is another story.) So we're not just "saved" by Jesus' sacrifice, we're forgiven and given new life. New life. Here and in the future.

Speaking of new and eternal life, I wonder (and I plan to ask him at some time in the future) if my dad ever sought forgiveness for his goat meat and wild game supper pranks. I do not have high hopes for the guy; I would not be surprised if he and his buddies are still trying to put one over on each other!

People, be safe, be smart, take care, keep the faith!
