#### FROM THE PASTOR:

I heated my former house primarily with wood for several years. I cut, loaded, unloaded, split, stacked, and carried a lot of wood into our house. This was never a problem. I had two teenagers who helped occasionally. My work schedule and my son's work/school schedule made it possible for us to feed the fire through the day. The only downside to the operation was when one of the children (who will remain nameless) would let the fire go out. I really disliked that.

Decades earlier my dad and mom were fortunate enough to find and buy (on the cheap) an old dilapidated miner's house they rebuilt (with the use of child labor- my older brother and myself) into a cozy cabin. My dad's bricklayer buddies helped him build an impressive fireplace with a huge firebox and several flues (with used brick cleaned/chiseled off by child labor - my brother and myself) and my dad found a pot bellied contraption of a wood burning stove (probably at someone's curb on trash day) and hooked it up. (This is because Germans like to have a show fireplace, but they don't want people to think they cut all the wood the big wasteful fireplace burns...). The cabin was heated entirely by wood.


The actual firewood cutting procedure was deceptively simple. That property was surrounded by state forest, and often my dad would forget exactly where the property boundaries were and there may have been some wood scavenged from the floor of the state property to heat the cabin. Dad did the cutting. (with an old yellow McColluch saw with a push button oiler on top) My brother and I carried and loaded all the wood. This taught us about the concept of division of labor, as my dad did the cutting and we did all the labor.

It also taught us a bit about physics and gravity and load. In Athens county, there is always a hill of some sort. Dad would park the truck traversing the hill, and then cut wood on the downhill side. Every single time. If you're not aware of how this plays out, it seems like every piece of wood we carried had to go uphill. And as we discovered, wood is always heavier when it has to be carried up hill. (Once a friend who taught physics disagreed with me on this discovery. He produced a written formula which he claimed proved my discovery was not true. I suggested he help me carry wood uphill the next time I cut wood to resolve the matter. (As you might guess, the matter is still unresolved!) My point being my dad always cut wood on the downhill side

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of the road and my brother and I always carried the cut wood uphill.


So once we were inside and a fire was started and the cabin was toasty warm, my dad would suggest that we appreciated the heat because of the work we put into the firewood operation. I thought that we would have appreciated the heat even without the work involved... I kept that to myself. A nice warm room/cabin/house is always appreciated.

What was NOT appreciated was if the fire was allowed to go out. This resulted in three things, none of which were desirable; First, the cabin gets cold, second, dad becomes grumpier than usual, and third, someone (me) has to restart the fire. Restarting is aggravating beyond words, because it is so avoidable!

Now then, back to my own house and wood heat. Letting the fire go out when my children were teens was also unappreciated. It also resulted in three undesirable things. Our house would get cold; the dad (me) would get grumpier (nuclear level grumpy;) and someone (not always me) would have to restart the fire. It's just so avoidable, and so very aggravating! So I dislike the idea of being so lazy as to let the fire go out- I hate letting the cold win for even a second.

The fire is more than heat and comfort. It's like warmth and light and even love. It's like taking care of the people around you. It's like a thing a person can share with family and friends. It says welcome. It shelters us and whomever we invite inside, from the cold outside. As long as the fire is burning, we're taking care of being taken care of. Yeah, it's love.

There is no Christmas birth story in the Gospel of John. But there is a comparison of Jesus (read chapter 1) to "the light." The writer calls Jesus the light of the world- and the part I love, that makes my Christmas complete- is where the writer John, calls Jesus the light that the darkness can't put out. The reader can see
