FROM THE PASTOR: What Exactly Is it You are Trying to Say Paul?

"Let he who is among us who has never struggled with something," Paul has written, "please raise their hand,"... and no hands are going up here folks. But all is not lost; let's look at a small part of Paul's letter to the Hebrews in its context and I am certain we will see discernible (as opposed to unreadable) good news Gospel here!

From Paul's Letter to the Hebrews, 7:11-22:

"Now if perfection had been attainable through the Levitical priesthood—for the people received the law under this priesthood—what further need would there have been to speak of another priest arising according to the order of Melchizedek, rather than one according to the order of Aaron? For when there is a change in the priesthood, there is necessarily a change in the law as well. Now the one of whom these things are spoken belonged to another tribe, from which no one has ever served at the altar. For it is evident that our Lord was descended from Judah, and in connection with that tribe Moses said nothing about priests. It is even more obvious when another priest arises, resembling Melchizedek, one who has become a priest, not through a legal requirement concerning physical descent, but through the power of an indestructible life. For it is attested of him,

"You are a priest forever, according to the order of Melchizedek."

There is, on the one hand, the abrogation of an earlier commandment because it was weak and ineffectual (for the law made nothing perfect); there is, on the other hand, the introduction of a better hope, through which we approach God.


This was confirmed with an oath; for others who became priests took their office without an oath, but this one became a priest with an oath, because of the one who said to him,

"The Lord has sworn and will not change his mind, 'You are a priest forever"—accordingly Jesus has also become the guarantee of a better covenant.

Okay, scholars pretty much agree that Paul may or may not have actually written this letter. But all agree it is written in the style Paul would use; and most agree it was written to a Jewish

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audience, as it explains Jesus in terms a first century

follower of Judaism would be able to easily understand. Unfortunately, the focus of the writing towards a first century audience makes it challenging for us at times to easily understand. Yes, I am referring to the use of priestly references in this reading. The jist of the priestly references in this part of the letter to the Hebrews, is to explain Jesus as the high priest: as the Hebrews understood what high priest meant. And what better high priest than Melchizedek? (His name means "king of righteousness" in Hebrew.) He was mentioned twice in the Hebrew's scriptures (aka Old Testament.) The first time was in Genesis, where he is referred to as a "Priest of the Most High God" and appears with wine and bread and gives a blessing to Abram.

The second time Melchizedek appears in the OT is in Psalm 110, where we presume it is David who is assured by God that he is a "priest forever according to the order of Mechizedek." So David, was a priest in the lineage of Melchizedek, and would have inherited Melchizedek's "Priest of the Most High God" name, status and power. And followers of Jesus past and present both understand that as Jesus descended from David's lineage, so Jesus would have descended from Melchizedek's lineage, and Jesus would have at the least the status of "Most High Priest" to the early Christ followers from the Jewish/ Hebrew faith tradition. Whew.

So, by explaining Jesus as a Priest, the writer is explaining a few things we might miss. For instance, a priest could perform rituals (sacraments) as they were considered to be able to get as close to God as a human could. This would help early folks see a Jesus to God relationship- not an easy thing for folks to accept then. Also, priests were authorized to "bind and loose the law" meaning they were authorized by God to apply the scriptures (and especially "the law") to the daily life of the Hebrews. This helps to explain Jesus' clarification of the scriptures so many times- as a priest he could do that without being a heretic or a blasphemer according to the understanding of the Hebrews.

It seems as if we could adapt the mindset of a first century Jewish-Jesus convert, that reading, understanding, and living scripture (and a faith life) would be a lot easier. For those of us who do not have time to become a first century Jewish scholar, allow me to offer the following:

In whatever context we think of Jesus, it's a good bet to think of Him as the Son of God, who came in human form as an example and teacher of God's love and salvation for the world. Jesus assumed the role of teacher, showing and commanding us to show God's love for the powerless and poor. Jesus assumed the role of a priest to show us God's love through teaching us the sacraments. And Jesus assumed the role of Savior by showing us that he would be and was, crucified, died, and resurrected, to show that not even death could interfere with God's love and plans to save his people(s).

That's enough of Paul for one newsletter. People of faith, children of God, go out there knowing that God loves us enough to send his Son in so many roles not just to get us through, but also to call us into getting others through whatever the world throws up against us. Peace!!!
